




now with my own children grown, I am continuing to enjoy experimenting and following mastery in my many fields of interest


Seth Sims


of 2019 and I did well. I sold 10 trees and I was hooked. Since then, I have






Our hopes are to show people that thinking critically about material choices, sizes, and






managing a bakery,


winter months for more art shows, work and recreation.

Carinne James fell in love with art as a child; she has a grandfather who was a painter, and another owned a print shop. She picked up linocut printmaking over a decade ago while volunteering as an art docent in Seattle. She



quickly fell in love with it and has refined her skills over the past decade.

Carinne enjoys the meditative process of creating a print: conceiving an idea, planning the image, the feel of the gouge pushing through the linoleum, the process of reduction and

refinement, rolling the ink, burnishing the print and, finally, pulling the paper away to produce the final image. She enjoys the connection to

the linoleum as she carves, and as she carves she becomes more deeply connected to the subject.

Carinne draws inspiration from her life – her travels across the country, raising her kids, and the nostalgia of her childhood. Her images capture these experiences, from her son blowing on a dandelion





to the flora and fauna found in the many places she's lived to anatomical prints inspired by her son's hospital visits. While these images are deeply personal to her, they build on common connections in the human experience.

Rocks 'N' Rattletag LLC • Lake Point, Utah


Artist of many styles and many years, Spencer D.

Erin loves hiking and big dogs.








Ryan Glasmann




I was introduced



act of creating and have made meaning out of my life because of it. This life has inspired my


art and in turn art has inspired my life.

Desert Gems Jewelry • Cedar City, Utah

I admit it. I'm a rockbound. At the age of 9, while my Dad worked as a summer ranger in Yellowstone National Park I found my first chips of agate & obsidian. I'd never found a rock that





you could see through before. discovered that there are beautiful things to see both looking up and down at the ground. In a Yellowstone gift shop I bought a sterling silver ring with a cabochon of Montana Moss agate. I was hooked. Moss agate is still one of my favorite stones.

As a teenager, I got a rock tumbler & a small

grinding/polishing machine. I made cabochons & even set some in jewelry I created with the lost wax process. Years later, I created our wedding rings using lost wax. I drifted away from rocks & jewelry until I was 39 when I started collecting beach agates near Pescadero in Northern Calif. A few years later I bought



the lapidary equipment & rock collection of a deceased rockbound. At the age of 50 I moved to southern Utah where I'm within minutes of great rockhounding locations. I've even made jewelry from agates I've found in my yard. I served as the president of the Southern Utah Rock Club in 2010-2011, & for the current year of 2014.

The stones I use in my jewelry, I find, cut & polish on lapidary equipment that I built myself. Finding the rocks out in nature is both an adventure & therapy. Living in the high desert I'm surrounded



by wonderful agates & jaspers. Much of this material has colors that reflect the red rock mountains of the southwest with a mix of red, orange, yellow, even purple, black, white, & blue. My favorite local agate, which I call Cosmo agate contains colors & patterns that resemble photos taken by the Hubble telescope.

I use a slab saw & trim

saw to cut rocks into manageable pieces, but I often take a small chip of agate or jasper found in the hills around me & grind, sand, & polish it into a cabochon without the aid of a saw. Some of these chips may be the result of the arrowhead

making process.

There are some colors & patterns that I can't find locally, so I purchase rocks in rough & slab form & cut, grind, & polish them.

I started doing wire wrap jewelry as a

way to present the beautiful stones in a wearable manner.

The way I wrap the Sterling Silver or Gold-filled wire around the stone compliments the stone but doesn't obscure or detract from it.


enjoys creating that one of a kind standout piece.

new guitar in hand, and she and the Black Hats are ready to rock. With Casler on drums and Vazquez on bass, you won't want to miss them!



Public Art Projects

Several new public art projects have just finished up and more are coming soon! Four new murals will grace the City of Moab this Spring & Summer season. Grand County High School Senior Ingrid Payne painted a mural of a white-lined sphinx moth on site at Moab Arts (111 E 100 N), and local artist Bitsy Tatera painted a vibrant crosswalk at the intersection of 500 W and 400 N. The Moab Charter School (358 E 300 S) received funding to complete a mural with students on their campus. Local artist Pine Bones, 2022 BLM Artist in Residence for the Moab Field Office, will paint a mural featuring a river otter design that will wrap around a restroom in the South parking lot at the junction of Highways 191 and 128.

A public, playable Art Piano will return to the Moab Information Center plaza at the intersection of Main and Center streets, featuring a fairy shrimp design painted by local artist Scott Brunmeier. Brunmeier also designed a dinosaur mosaic that will adorn the final concrete planter in front of the Moab Arts building on 100 North, completing the set of four.

The above projects were selected by the Moab Arts team from a pool of 24 project proposals submitted by 18 different artists and groups. Proposals were scored for community fit, novelty, lifespan, feasibility, and the skills and experience of the artist.





Celebrate Spring with the Moab Music Festival's High Water Festival

The Moab Music Festival (MMF) joins forces with the mighty Colorado in a series of magnificent concerts set in breathtaking outdoor destinations along its banks—and even on the water itself. MMF brings music and landscape together for incomparable concerts that have set it apart for 30 years. As the river runs high with spring snowmelt, water is the theme for this second annual High Water festival, held June 9 to 17. The variety of breathtaking locales offer something for everyone, starting with 2023 Grammy-winner Kevin Puts' Arches for violin in a floating concert aboard an open-air boat on the Colorado performed by up-and-coming Utah native

Aubree Oliverson. Salt Lake's exciting new swing band Hot House West Quartet gives new meaning to "floating" with a set of jazz with a Western twist, and the ever-popular Music Hike is back, but for the entire family this time, less physically rigorous, and only \$25 for parents and \$5 for kids, featuring the Hot House West Quartet in standards from Duke Ellington to Disney and NOLA to LA.

One of the main events is a very special garden party to benefit the BEACON Summer Strings Music Camp, a local youth music education program. A celebratory evening in an exquisite local garden features the talents of six extraordinary in-demand musicians. The 25-yearold attention-grabbing violinist Aubree Oliverson is joined by Bay Area cellist and noted outdoorsman Mark Votapek for the virtuosic Kodaly Duo. The Hot House West Quartet is already making waves, and for this event will shake things up with a tribute set to one the luminaries of hot jazz, Django Reinhardt. In addition to the stunning program and unparalleled local hospitality, the ticket also includes drinks and show-stopping hors d'œuvres served before the performance celebrating the community while supporting the continuation of local music making. Festival Artistic Director Leslie Tomkins says about the benefit, "It's one of the area's most spectacular private gardens, and a unique opportunity to be a part of the community that makes Moab so special. Tickets to this special evening are sure

The High Water spring festival concludes with a free Community Concert for the whole family at Old City Park with classic chamber music and jazz standards, and a new Musical Raft Trip through Desolation Canyon. This four-day excursion on the Green River pairs whitewater rapids and pristine remote wilderness with daily performances from classic violin and cello repertoire to work from the great American songbook. It's the ultimate place to enjoy cocktail hour serenades in one of the most remote areas in the lower 48. The trip is outfitted by Sheri Griffith River Expeditions and river historian John Weisheit, co-founder of Living Rivers, provides interpretation. National Geographic says "there is nothing at all desolate about this canyon—it is instead a paradise."

Program Updates

In 2022 we made some changes to our Farmer's Markets (Arts & Ag), the Red Rock Arts Festival, and the Holiday Craft Fair.

After our events and programs we send out feedback surveys and collect and review the information to help us plan for these events in the future. We try to incorporate as much of the feedback as we can and continuously improve. The City of Moab also went through an intense visioning process that included surveys and meetings with the community. One of the big takeaways from that work showed that the Community Fabric is very important to our residents. In that, people that live in Moab want to be a part of events, feel welcome, and get to know their neighbors. We hope that some of our programs will help build more of a sense of community and encourage participation.

Some of the big changes to note in 2023:

Year Round Classes

As the only art center in the area, we felt it was important to expand our arts classes from just winter sessions to year round options. We are also working on adding more class options for kids and seniors. Check out moabarts.org/classes to see what we have on deck for the next couple of months!

Markets

Based on feedback from the 2022 season, our staff has scheduled the 2023 season markets to align with some of our community's beloved events at Swanny Park, such as Free Movie Moab and the Free Concert Series. You asked for more food, music, and activities and we hope to provide that this year by hosting fewer markets with more to offer at each one.

• Red Rock Arts Festival

Last year we re-branded the festival with a focus on play and participation, and added a variety of new elements. This year we hope to create another festival atmosphere that is welcoming and engaging. The 2023 festival theme and more information will be coming this summer.

Arts & Ag

The Moab Arts Center kicked off 2023 with year-round arts classes. We offer 2-3 classes per month in a diverse range of class offerings from Watercolor Painting to Drawing to Manual Photography. Summer is almost here that means Arts & Rec Summer Camp will be here soon! Camp runs for four weeks in June, starting Monday the 5th, and runs Monday-Thursday from 9am-4pm and Fridays 9am-1pm. We start our mornings with creative art projects that involve different themes at the MARC, then have some play time at the Gym to stay active and have fun with our fellow campers, after lunch it's pool time at the MRAC to finish off those hot afternoons.

In March of 2023 we hosted two Artists in Residence as a part of the **ReUse Residency Program** and in August we will host two more. Moab Arts Reuse Residency's mission is to challenge the perception of waste culture by providing a unique platform for artists at the intersection of art, community, and waste systems. Roundhouse Platform, the artist duo during our March Residency, focused their work on a project entitled "Pre-Cretaceous/Post-Consumer". The project is a zero-waste, reversible architecture project that seeks to raise awareness about the material flows of prehistoric geology and contemporary waste in Moab, UT. Come August, be on the lookout for workshops, studio visits, and artist talks with our new set of Residents!

Our facility is home to many people and groups and has a lot to offer. You may have rented one of the rooms at the MARC for a meeting or gathering or maybe you have attended a movie showing, concert or dance that was hosted in our building. We also have a **Coworking space** at the MARC and it is available from Monday to Friday from 8am-5pm. This space is available for those working remotely passing through town, or to locals that need an office space regularly for emails and calls. We offer monthly memberships or daily passes. 

Grassroots Shakespeare Company

Shakespeare's players were an interesting bunch. For starters, none of them had a complete copy of the script. Instead, they used "cue scripts," consisting only of their cues and their lines. This meant they had to listen extremely carefully to each other in order to perform their parts. On top of that, their rehearsal process was unbelievably short – in fact, some people believe they didn't rehearse at all!

Also, they had no director, no designers, and no "concept." Instead, the actors directed themselves, brought their own costumes and props, and relied on the sun to light them. As a result, the plays they performed were probably nothing like what you'll see at any other more traditional theater company. In Elizabethan times, Shakespeare's plays probably had



anachronistic costumes and music, constant audience interaction, and a lot of improvisation.

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In the spirit of these original practices, the Grassroots Shakespeare Company was born to explore the text of Shakespeare's plays by performing them under similar conditions. We use cue scripts, we use the sun, we improvise, and we bring our own costumes and props. What you'll see, if you come to one of our

shows, is a vibrant, highenergy performance of some beautiful language and fun music, probably in a grassy, sunlit park.

This year we'll be performing two Shakespeare plays: The Tempest on Saturday, May 27 & Romeo & Juliet on Sunday, May 28.

The Grassroots Shakespeare Company

is a collaborative touring ensemble of multidisciplinary artists who create joyous, vibrant productions inspired by Shakespeare's original staging techniques. Through open-air performances, interactive workshops, and scholarly events we produce and promote genuinely engaging, popular and relevant theatre. Join us for The Tempest and Hamlet!

Canyonlands PRCA Rodeo

The Canyonlands PRCA Rodeo has been a tradition in Grand County for over 50 years!

Swanny City Park in Moab is named after D.A. Swanny Kerby who together with his wife, Verda brought early rodeo to Utah around 1945.

The Canyonlands PRCA Rodeo Club is an all volunteer organization. Throughout the year, many dedicated folks spend hours working tirelessly to make the rodeo come alive.

The rodeo is funded through sponsor businesses within our community, along with ticket and other sales.

The Canyonlands PRCA Rodeo is the only professional sporting event put on in Moab and offers two nights and an afternoon of thrilling PRCA Pro Rodeo action. Cowboys and cowgirls travel from all over the West to compete in seven events: Steer Wrestling, Team Roping, Saddle Bronc Riding, Barrel Racing, Bull Riding, Bareback Riding and Tie Down Roping.

Our rodeo also offers two children's events—Mutton Bustin' and Stick Pony Races and each year, club members offer pony rides to children during the Moab Arts Festival.

On Saturday night after the rodeo, everyone kicks up their heels and enjoys live music.

The Canyonlands PRCA Rodeo Club works hard engaging our youth and building partnerships within the community so that this great tradition of rodeo can be carried on to future generations.
